These homes remain now practically as they were a half century ago . . . Then callers drove up to the horse block in surreys instead of cylin-

dered contraptions propelled by gas . . . Similar comments might be made regarding Elmira's business section, where firm names frequently have been altered . . . On Water Street chain stores largely have gobbled up available locations, though some of the old standbys hold their ground, H. Strauss, Sheehan, Dean & Company and others . . .

COR A TIME, as the city's business stretched out, there was a question whether Baldwin or Main Streets would be accepted for commercial purposes by firms seeking to stir themselves and keep abreast with progress . . . In the end, Main Street got the decision, possibly through the vision of the late Ed. Dunn, who foresaw business advantages on the street extending as far north as West Third . . . The trend has been gradual, but locations are more and more in demand daily, proving Mr. Dunn's wisdom.

ONE COULD go on, prodding memory in search of facts, and write quite a volume on business and residential changes that have accrued . . .
