"An ounce of prevention is worth a TON of cure," warn Elmira Safety officials who point out that common sense and adherence to simple rules will eliminate the tragedies which too often stalk national holidays.

Fire, water and, motor accidents exact the greatest toll on Memorial Day-and "most of them can be avoided" declared Fire Chief Daniel Collins, Police Chief Elvin D. Weaver, Weldon McCluskey, YMCA physical director, and Miss Irma Jane Bush, local Red Cross director.

"Build your picnic fires on bare ground or on green grass turf," urges Chief Collins, "and make sure there is water nearby in case of treacherous winds.

"Turn off your gas heaters before leaving home; and ladies, disconnect those electric irons with which you press your holiday finery and DON'T freshen your clothes with gasoline cleaners!"

PROPERTY DAMAGE by careless motorists is the danger most to be feared on Memorial Day, said Chief Weaver.



Thrill Draws Sailors to Sub Service

Portsmouth- (AP) -A "bonus" goes with submarine service in the U. S. Navy, but it's the "spirit of adventure" that attracts men to the undersea craft.

"An unusual occupation—there's something catchy about it," observed a veteran naval officer in this port-off which the hapless submarine Squalus lay with her 26 dead, at the bottom of the ocean.

A majority of the men on "subs" are volunteers for this service-and only those especially "physically and temperamentally" fitted are accepted. On the "fleet type" of undersea

craft like the Squalus-one that operates from a mother ship—the "bonus" ranges from \$10 to \$30 a Years ago the men were paid \$1

U.S. Eases Export Ban On Helium

Washington-(AP)-The National Munitions Control Board he highly-prized American helding gas limitedly available to other countries for peacetime purposes. Prior to official announcement it

was indicated that exports to any

one country would be limited to 300,000 cubic feet a year. THIS AMOUNT, authorities said, was not considered to be of military importance. The gas probably will be used abroad for experimental purposes and in hospitals where it has been found helpful in the care

of respiratory ailments. The new action was expected to prove of little or no help to the German-American Zeppelin Corporation in its efforts to obtain supplies of the non-inflammable gas to operate the dirigible LZ-130, successor to the Hindenburg which exploded over Lakehurst, N. J., in
