

2 New York Dairies Adopt Fiber Milk

Sheffield Farms and Borden's, two of the largest customers of the Thatcher Manufacturing Company announced today that they would fiber containers instead of glass bottles for the delivery of milk in New York City.

The new container, developed after 15 months of research, will be of two-quart capacity and will mean a saving of one and a half cents on a quart of milk. The saving will be passed on to the consumer, the two firms asserted. Fiber containers have been used in stores and schools in New York

for more than a year, but glass bottles have been used for home deliveries. William H. Marcussen, president of Borden's Farm Products, pointed out that fiber containers in the single quart size had been introduced 10 years ago in New York City and that five million a week

were now being used. "The two-quart container for home delivery is merely an adaptation to this purpose of an article which has been proven in practice and already has wide public accept-Daniel D.
