The passage will be of reinforced concrete pipe with an inside diameter of 8 feet and an outside diameter of 9 feet, 6 inches. The pipe is in 5-foot sections, weighing 71/2 tons a section. If weather is favorable, project can be completed in about two months, it is esti-
