He repeated an offer made yesterday to submit his list of signatures to "any impartial community group" or to "handwriting experts" to back up his claim. The UE says it has as union members "75 or 80 per cent" of the 521 GE employes eligible to vote in a bargaining

election. Robinson said today that the NLRB has already indicated its conviction that "we (IUE) have sufficient interest" by calling Friday's hearing, but that the UE can eliminate the need for a formal hearing by consenting to an immediate election.
