Two decades after Huey Long's assassination, Long is still a big name in Louisiana politics. But, today, his survivors play the game differently. Long had risen to be governor, then senator, and had hopes of becoming President. He was lavish with promises to "share the wealth," to make "every man a king," and to give every family \$5,000 a year "when I am in the White House." However, even his constant circle of bodyguards couldn't save him from the single bullet fired by a young doctor who cut Long down without a word and then died himself in a hail of bullets fired by the "dictator's" bodyguards. When Long died, he left nothing to show even a start toward fulfilling his promises. What he might have done, had he lived, is still being argued in Louisiana.
